

FRANKLIN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

MINUTES OF GENERAL SESSION

September 6, 2022

The Franklin County Board of Commissioners convened in the Commissioners Hearing Room, at 9:00 A.M. on Tuesday, September 6, 2022.

Commissioner Crawley called the meeting to order at 9:09 A.M.

Commissioner Crawley: Good morning everyone, and happy September. As we mentioned last week, September is Hunger Action Month. Unfortunately, almost four hundred thousand of our neighbors leaned on the Mid-Ohio Food Collective for food assistance last year. Even more distressing, the leadership there tells us that the demand they're seeing is unprecedented and that their resources are stretched increasingly thin. We understand that the Food Collective has asked the State of Ohio to allocate some American Rescue Plan funding for emergency food purchases, but that it has not yet received a reply, so we will continue to highlight Hunger Action Month and the increased need throughout September.

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Commissioner Crawley: September is also National Neonatal Intensive Care Awareness Month. Neonatal intensive care units, or NICUs, are where premature or sick babies will be cared for in the first days and sometimes weeks of their young lives. They're staffed by neonatologists and devoted nurses who give these sick children the best possible chance at life. We must also focus on measures that could lower the chances of NICU visits. For example, housing instability and homelessness increase the likelihood of pre-term birth, infant mortality, and acute health conditions. Through investments in housing, nutrition, and environmental conditions, our moms and babies will have safer and healthier experiences and outcomes.

Commissioner Crawley (cont.): Franklin County has supported maternal and infant health, including investing in the Franklin County Public Health home visiting program, Restoring Our Own Through Transformation (ROOTT) funding for perinatal doula support services, and CelebrateOne's programs and initiatives, including the birth equity center. In Franklin County, we're lucky to have several of the best NICUs around, though it is hopefully a resource most families won't need. We encourage pregnant people to get connected with prenatal care and parental support groups, learn about supporting a healthy pregnancy, and so much more. And in cases where the NICU *is* needed, we're glad to have that resource available, and we celebrate the dedicated doctors, nurses, and technicians who staff them.

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Approval of the minutes for the August 25, 2022, Briefing Session; and the August 31, 2022, Administrative Briefing Session. Commissioner Boyce moved to approve the minutes, seconded by Commissioner O'Grady. The minutes were unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Commissioner Boyce: What about all-electric vehicles? I know that the cruisers have a lot of requirements, but when I was at the U.S. Conference of Mayors, they had some really nice electric cruisers. Are we looking at electric vehicles? Most manufacturers are going all-electric in the next ten to twenty years. We are already starting to see states that are banning gas-powered vehicles.

Ms. Ashcraft: We do have two all-electric vehicles in the fleet currently. One is in the pool downtown so that it can be used by all of the agencies, and they can see how it operates. We recently purchased a Ford F-150 Lightning, which is an all-electric pick-up truck. Its range is significantly larger than the other electric vehicle that we have. It is advertised to get 300 miles per charge, and we have gotten up to 269 miles per charge with it. We always look for hybrid or all-electric options when we purchase. Currently, there are a lot of hybrids available. Often, drivers get “range anxiety” because they are unsure they will be able to get to a destination and back without needing a charge. Generally, they can, but there is still some discomfort surrounding that. The only time we do not purchase a hybrid is when there is not one available for the application that is needed.

Commissioner Boyce: I want to encourage you to think of a more deliberate and aggressive strategy. We do not want to be reacting as everyone else is trying to react to the electric vehicle movement. When you look at all of the legislative policies coming out of the White House today and the national strategy coming out of the Department of Transportation, and given the struggle that we are having with gas prices, I want to encourage you to think proactively about obtaining more electric vehicles. We could start with a cost analysis. With hybrids, are we seeing a reduction in fuel purchased? Are we seeing maintenance costs reduce? I would love to see where we stand in regards to beginning to incorporate more electric vehicles into our fleet.

Commissioner Crawley: I would like to second what Commissioner Boyce said. A couple of weeks ago, Administrator Wilson and I had a conversation at the Conference of Mayors’ dinner about electric vehicles. Eventually, there will be more electric vehicle charging stations, which will help with some of that “range anxiety.” I think we should set a goal for when we would like to have all electric vehicles in our fleet.

Commissioner Boyce moved to approve Resolution 0645-22, seconded by Commissioner O’Grady. The Resolution was unanimously adopted by roll call vote.

Resolution No. 0646-22, authorizing the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services Director to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Workforce Development Board

Commissioner Crawley: Will our neighbors that are in the Women at Work Program also qualify for this?

Mr. Logan: As long as they are enrolled in SNAP and Ohio Works First, and once they hit the milestones (30 days of employment for the first \$500 incentive; 60 days of employment to get the second \$500 incentive), I do not see any reason that they would not be eligible. We can work to make sure that there is a referral system in place for them.

Commissioner Boyce moved to approve Resolution 0646-22, seconded by Commissioner O'Grady. The Resolution was unanimously adopted by roll call vote.

Resolution No. 0652-22, appointing Trudy Bartley to the Franklin County Parks and Recreation Board of Trustees (Board of Commissioners), presented by Brittany A. Razek, Clerk to the Board of Commissioners and Director of Community Appointments.

Ms. Razek reviewed information found in documents submitted with the proposed resolution.

Commissioner Boyce: I have some thoughts that I would like to share. At the end of the day, the most valuable part of being a Commissioner is that we have the ability to work together to make decisions in what we believe to be the best interest of the Franklin County residents.

Commissioner Boyce (cont.): To the Clerk and County Administration, I would like to request that we set aside time, in either an Executive Session or a retreat, to really talk about how we go about qualifying individuals to serve on various boards for Franklin County. In all of my time in politics, one of the most frightening experiences I have had was learning of the ethics violations at the Columbus Zoo this past year. At the time, I was President of the Board, and I wasn't even aware that I was a member of the Zoo Board by virtue of being President of the Board. I think that illustrates the breakdown in our own internal process. It is important to make sure that we are doing our part as a governmental body, and it is important to appoint people to these boards that are not only qualified but capable. These board members are fiducially responsible for the actions of that entity. When things happened at the Columbus Zoo, those folks were liable in many ways. Our responsibility as the Board of Commissioners is to make sure that we are appointing qualified individuals to serve so that the public's interests and resources are protected to the best of our ability. Administrator Wilson, we really need to dig into this, and at this point, I would like to put a hold on all board appointments until we are able to come to some agreement regarding the process of making appointments. This is something we have been working on since I got here, and it has gotten a little bit better, and I think Clerk Razek has done a great job of managing that. But we can do better, and we have to do better. Part of the process is subjective, such as splitting hairs about who is and is not qualified to serve. But if we establish clear criteria and there is a vetting process that maybe the Clerk conducts before the candidates get to us, I think that can alleviate some of the time that we spend trying to make these appointments. This is something that I know we all take very seriously.

Kenneth N. Wilson, County Administrator: I have been in communication with staff, and this has been an ongoing discussion. We intend to review the process of making board appointments at a deeper level.

Commissioner Crawley: The Clerk's office has been wonderful about working with my office on board appointments. When I first came on, I requested that we gather the bylaws for each board and commission. I know that you have worked very diligently to be able to get those. I think that even before we have a conversation about the process, which we can have, I also think that it is good to know how the boards are structured and about their governance. If we are talking about the process, we can also talk about changes that need to be made, especially as it relates to our responsibility to make appointments, so that we do not have another situation like the Zoo or SWACO. I think that there are some foundational things that need to occur first before we can have a robust conversation about how we move forward with each individual board.

Ms. Razek: I appreciate all of the feedback, and I welcome further conversation offline so that we can make sure that we have a great process and one that you all are on board with moving forward.

Commissioner Boyce moved to approve Resolution 0652-22, seconded by Commissioner O'Grady. The Resolution was adopted by roll call vote.

Resolution No. 0653-22, appointing Luke Fedlam to the Franklin County Parks and Recreation Board of Trustees (Board of Commissioners), presented by Brittany A. Razek, Clerk to the Board of Commissioners and Director of Community Appointments.

Ms. Razek reviewed information found in documents submitted with the proposed resolution.

Commissioner Boyce moved to approve Resolution 0653-22, seconded by Commissioner O'Grady. The Resolution was unanimously adopted by roll call vote.

Resolution No. 0654-22, appointing Jaiza Page to the Franklin County Parks and Recreation Board of Trustees (Board of Commissioners), presented by Brittany A. Razek, Clerk to the Board of Commissioners and Director of Community Appointments.

Ms. Razek reviewed information found in documents submitted with the proposed resolution.

Commissioner Boyce moved to approve Resolution 0654-22, seconded by Commissioner O'Grady. The Resolution was unanimously adopted by roll call vote.

Resolution No. 0655-22, urging a multi-faceted community, legislative, and policy response at the local, state, and federal level, and committing Franklin County resources and action to address the scourge of gun violence in our community and across the nation (Board of Commissioners), presented by Lauren Rummel, Director, Government Affairs and Ethics, Board of Commissioners.

Ms. Rummel reviewed information found in documents submitted with the proposed resolution.

Commissioner Boyce: Who are we sending this to?

Ms. Rummel: I would be happy to send it to our Federal and State partners, in addition to any key community partners and individuals that you would like me to.

Commissioner Boyce: I think that it is important that when we pass resolutions such as this one, people know that we do something with them. I think that a letter to the President, a letter to the legislature, maybe our delegation and the speaker, maybe a letter to the Governor, would be appropriate. We could also share this with the NAACP, the Urban League, and some of the other folks who have been advocates. Include CCAO and NACo, as well.

Commissioner Crawley: I would like to say thank you for all of your work on this. I want to thank Commissioner O'Grady and his work for continuing to elevate this conversation, whether it is at CCAO, LUCC, or NACo. I want to thank Commissioner Boyce for his thoughts and input from where we were before to where we are now.

Commissioner Crawley (cont.): Thank you for integrating veterans, as well as pregnant people in this resolution. One thing that I want to highlight is law enforcement violence. We can speak to that from a public health crisis perspective, but I do not want to lose sight that that is also gun violence, especially when we see people losing their lives at the hands of law enforcement and the trauma that causes in communities, generationally. We are working with the Sheriff's Office and the State to provide training for de-escalation tactics and techniques, as well as training on how to interact with people in the community and the effect that those interactions have on the mental health of the community. We had a conversation with some youth in the community a couple of months ago, and some young men spoke about how they or their friends have had guns and the reasons behind having them. We have to be able to have those conversations from a place of understanding and not condemnation or conviction. We need to understand why our youth are engaging in criminality and violence and using guns as a weapon to navigate life. A lot of them do not have the mindset that they will live to see the age of twenty-one or twenty-five, and that is something that we need to be able to address to the extent that we can. One thing that I know about our youth, as I focused on juvenile delinquency during my undergrad in criminology, is that it is the social bonds that youth develop that help them decide whether to engage in criminality when given a choice. When youth have meaningful social bonds, they do not think about the punishment or serving time in prison or losing their life; they think about not wanting to disappoint their favorite teacher who looks forward to them coming to class and after-school programs every day. Even when youth do not have a home environment that supports their thriving, the social bonds with the person who lets them know that they matter, are valued, are loved, and make the biggest impact. Deputy County Administrator Bivens and Director Pride have been looking for people in the community who can carry those messages for our youth and teach them to play the hand that they have been dealt in life. They send the message that a person's current situation does not dictate future success. One thing that has flown under the radar that has really helped in this area is our Urban ROOTS Program with OSU. This Board made an investment of \$120,000 to this program to help support forty eighth graders. When we look at the target age of those who are engaging in criminality, it is around eighth grade. The Urban ROOTS Program is an agricultural program that is year-round because OSU understands the need for ongoing engagement with the youth and the importance of community bonds. The youth need a place to go and receive mentorship, and those are the social bonds that will keep them from engaging in criminality. When Administrator Wilson and I were at the Urban Institute, he asked what communities are doing with ARPA dollars to address gun violence, especially for our youth. One of the ladies who perform policy work for the USDA mentioned that we do not often think of agriculture as a deterrent for violence, but we should start looking at it in that way. That is exactly what we are doing with Urban ROOTS. We have to think outside of the box because what we have been doing that is mainstream is not working.

Commissioner O'Grady: I originally brought this issue forward because as the Chair of the Large Urban County Caucus at NACo, I have colleagues across the country that are dealing with shootings in their communities. I have colleagues in Erie County, New York, who are dealing with the shooting that occurred at the Buffalo grocery store, and colleagues in Texas who are dealing with the Uvalde school shooting. As Chair of the Caucus, I decided

we needed to have this conversation on a national level because we are Commissioners and we cannot continue to let these things happen. When I started talking to County Administration about this issue, DCA Bivens was able to bring a group of kids in from our community in Franklin County to talk to us about why they carry guns. They often do not carry guns because they want to; they carry them because everyone around them carries guns, and they feel unsafe leaving the house without one. There are a lot of ways that we can help this situation, and I know that everyone that we work with has tons of ideas, but as leaders, we have to be willing and able to go looking for them in all of the places that they exist. This is a big issue, and it is going to keep happening until we stop it. It has become the norm to turn on the TV and hear about another shooting in another city. That is why we need to keep having these conversations here, across the state, and across the country.

Kenneth N. Wilson, County Administrator: I want to echo the compliments to the entire staff who had a hand in this resolution. Director Rummel, you took this, and now it is an improved product. We originally thought that it was a good product, but we took it to the next level. It is better than what we started with because it is not just the statement of a problem. A large portion of gun violence in urban communities is associated with individuals who do not feel that they have hope or opportunity. When we look at the Juvenile Detention Center, there are capacity issues and kids that are constantly going in and out of that facility. There are parents who don't know what to do and have lost hope in trying to work with their youth. We need to create additional opportunities through action, and I think a lot of that is in this resolution. There are a lot of ways to go about this, and because of that, we need to solicit community input on actions that can be taken within Franklin County's authority, to deal with this problem. We are all students of public policy, and we all try to follow national best practices, but there is no substitute for speaking with the community to determine what we might be missing. Under the Board's leadership, we have a lot of helpful tools, including the Poverty Blueprint, and our hyperfocus on equity. All of those things matter, but we also need to communicate with the community, and that is part of this resolution. This resolution asks us to seek new partnerships with public, private, non-profit, and community groups to reduce gun violence. Every resident of Franklin County owns this resolution; we all have an obligation and a responsibility to lead from where we are. We have done a good job, under the Commissioners' direction, to get to this point, but in the 2023 budget, I would like every one of our agency directors to think about what their agency can do to contribute to this particular issue. We want to make 2023 different from a budgetary standpoint, a public policy standpoint, and through our actions. We need to challenge ourselves.

Commissioner Boyce: As Franklin County Commissioners, we do not manage neighborhoods. In the granular sense, we do not have the same role in neighborhoods that the City of Columbus or municipalities have; they are not our jurisdiction. One area on which we do have a direct impact, however, is the jail system. When people are incarcerated, we have them as a captive audience to address some of the challenges that lead to violent activities and the use of guns. I think our real opportunities to make an impact are through our work with the new jail and our mental health resources. I had the

fortune of being on a panel this weekend with several other elected officials regarding the recent shooting of a young man by the Columbus Police Department. There are so many levels to this conversation, and I am eager to get deeper into it. I think that Director Pride can be our lead person for the County in the broader conversation. Congratulations, Director Rummel, on being so diligent about this work. This was not easy. You started off one way, and we had some input, and I love the way you dissected that and came back with something even better. This resolution is far more substantive and offers things that we can actually do to be engaged in combatting this issue.

Commissioner Boyce moved to approve Resolution 0655-22, seconded by Commissioner O'Grady. The Resolution was unanimously adopted by roll call vote.




